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Definitions

Index

In finance, an index is a statistical measure that reflects the performance of a group of stocks, or other assets.

It acts as a benchmark for investors to track the overall performance of a specific market segment or sector. For example, the FTSE 100 in the UK, or the S&P 500 in the US, are well-known market indices.

Diversification

Diversification means not putting all your eggs in one basket.

Instead of relying on just one type of investment, your money is spread across different companies, sectors, and parts of the world. This way, if one area doesn't do well, other investments can help balance things out — making your overall portfolio more stable over time

Asset Allocation

Asset allocation is the process of dividing your investments among different asset classes, such as stocks and bonds.

It involves determining the ideal percentage of your portfolio to allocate to each asset type based on your risk tolerance, investment time horizon, and financial objectives.

What is Blended Investing?

Blended investing gives you the best of both worlds: the cost efficiency of passive funds with the benefits and flexibility of active management.

Some financial advisers create their own "blended" portfolios by manually mixing two separate investment solutions on behalf of clients. While this approach can work, it can also add complexity, extra administration, and less clarity over costs and outcomes.

Understanding Passive and Active Investing

Passive investing focuses on keeping costs low by buying funds that are designed to replicate the performance of a market or index. This means that passive funds look to invest in the same companies, at the same levels as the market.

This investment style requires less buying and selling, making it simpler and often cheaper than active investing.

Example

The biggest stock market in the UK is the FTSE 100, which consists of the UK's 100 largest publicly traded companies.

A passive fund may therefore choose to track the UK by buying all 100 stocks that make up the FTSE 100.

Active investing takes a more hands-on approach, with fund managers researching and selecting investments they believe will outperform the market or help manage risk.

Rather than simply following an index, active managers look for opportunities, adjust allocations, and can respond to changing conditions more efficiently — offering the potential to add value and protect against downturns.

Why Consider a Blended Approach?

When the world moves and markets change, your investments should be ready to change too.

Different regions, sectors, and investments can move in and out of favour, while interest rates, inflation, and global events create constant change.

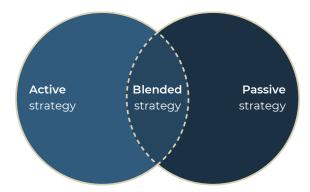
