

# Flexible Planning: Semi-Retirement with a Modest Pension

Andrew is 60 and beginning semi-retirement after building up a defined contribution pension pot of £225,000 over his career. He is now navigating the transition from accumulating to decumulating. His financial goal is to maintain flexibility — continuing to take on ad hoc consultancy work while also making time to travel, including touring Europe in a camper van. This will mean he needs to be able to adjust his income accordingly.

To achieve this balance, Andrew decided to take his 25% tax-free cash to repay his mortgage, create an emergency fund, cover larger one-off expenses, and purchase the camper van. With the remainder of his pension, he sought advice from his financial adviser.

After discussing the options, Andrew chose a flexible drawdown arrangement rather than purchasing an annuity, valuing the potential for growth and income this wrapper could provide over the course of his retirement. Andrew recognises that market volatility could affect the longevity of his fund, but he is confident that by adjusting his work and lifestyle balance, and by investing cautiously, he can sustain his retirement income.

# The Challenge
